# POSITION DESCRIPTION

Position: Archaeologist

Department: Backcountry

Reports To: Camp Director – Indian Writings

Desired Availability: May 27 – August 21

#### **Philmont Standards**

 Must be at least 18 years of age by start of employment; some positions require a minimum age of 21 by start of employment

- Must become a registered member of the Boy Scouts of America at the start of employment and subscribe to the Scout Oath, Scout Law, and Declaration of Religious Principles
- Must provide a completed BSA Annual Health and Medical Record to the Infirmary upon arrival
- Must maintain a clean, well-groomed appearance and be willing to purchase required uniform parts to meet Philmont's uniform policy
- Must participate in designated staff training
- Must adhere to the policies and programs set forth by Philmont Scout Ranch management

### **Position Overview**

The Archaeologist is responsible for teaching and demonstrating the archaeological history of Philmont Scout Ranch through program features such as petroglyph tours, excavation dig sites, and museum presentations. The Archaeologist is eager to be part of a team facilitating mentally and physically engaging program and isn't afraid to get a dirty. This position reports directly to the Camp Director of Indian Writings camp.

#### Primary Duties & Responsibilities

- Responsible for the management and operation of the dig site at Indian Writings camp
- Present Archaeology programs on time with all materials on hand, ready to go
- Present a program that imparts useful knowledge that supports aims and objective of the Boy Scouts of America and is fun, challenging, stimulating and safe
- The Archaeologist works with other members of the Indian Writings team to present programs (first established in 1956 by Gene Lutes) that teach Scouts the scientific methods of archaeology. These program features include the following:
  - Petroglyph Tour: Outline the cultural history of the North Ponil Canyon using Ancestral Puebloans and Jicarilla Apache petroglyphs
  - Foundation Tour: Outline the history, historical significance and usage, excavation history of the Ancestral Puebloan pit house, Ancestral Puebloan slab house, and the more modern Hispanic cabin foundation
  - Excavation: (Led by the IW Archaeologist) teaching methods of Archeology by allowing Scouts to participate in an actual excavation at a designated dig site
  - o Museum: Display various artifacts found in the canyon and items on loan from the Philmont Museum

- Lab: (Led by the IW Archaeologist) assist in the setup and use of the lab and to demonstrate techniques in cleaning, cataloging, and storing artifacts found in the dig site.
- Teach the history and chronology of the North Ponil Canyon, which is as follows:
  - 400 AD to 1250 AD: inhabited by Ancestral Puebloans; Progression from hunting and gathering to growing some agriculture and living in permanent dwellings (pit and slab houses)
  - o 1500: Jicarilla Apache
  - Mid to late 1800's: Hispanic Settlers
  - o 1907-1923: Cimarron Northwestern Railroad
  - o 1923-1938: Ranching (Chase, UU Bar, Philmont)
  - o 1938: Waite Phillips donated land to the BSA
  - 1941: Samuel Bogan led the Philturn Archaeological Expedition which is described in the book Let the Coyotes Howl.
  - o 1956: Gene Lutes began the archaeological program at Indian Writings
- Maintain a clean and efficient program area
- Check material frequently and keep the Camp Director informed of any program supplies needed
- Insure proper use, security, and care of program equipment
- Use proper archaeological procedures and record keeping practices, including the following: Excavation techniques, screening, establishing levels, collection of artifacts, cleaning labeling and cataloging of artifacts, and use of established datums
- Practice proper surveying and mapping procedures if identifying other potential archaeological sites
- Help the Camp Director compile information for the end of season report from observations and knowledge
  of the Archaeology program(s), and complete a separate report detailing the work and duties completed as
  the Archaeologist
- Assist with camp chores cleaning showers and latrines, checking in crews, checking trails and trail camps, and other miscellaneous camp operations and tasks
- Assist with other staff responsibilities as directed by the Camp Director to ensure that the mission of the Philmont Scout Ranch is carried out

## Qualifications/Experience

- A degree in Archaeology is preferred, but applications from students in the latter years of their degree program will also be considered
- Experience working on an archaeological dig site is required
- Ability to work with multiple ranch departments and work in a busy and fast paced environment is expected
  of all applicants

## Physical Requirements & Work Environment

- The Archaeologist position lives and operates in the backcountry at Indian Writings camp
- Physically able to hike and meet backcountry hiking requirements (The dig site is an eighth of a mile from camp, and will require hiking to and from the job site daily)
- Hiking will also be required to assist the camp in managing the Area of Responsibility for campsite inspections, emergency response, crew support, etc.
- Must be able to lift and handle materials up to 70 lbs.
